## Reflecting Upon Chris Schulze's Eight Years of Service to the FSAA

When the Ford Scholar Alumni Association Board of Directors gathered for their Oct. 5 quarterly meeting, a familiar face was missing.

Schulze. His eight years of service as a FSAA member at large ended in July.

Schulze ran for the position in the spring of 2006, after the interim executive board established the foundation for the FSAA.

"Mr. Ford always impressed on us how important it is to give back. Serving on the board seemed like an opportunity to give back," said Schulze, from the Class of 1995. "On a more selfish note, it seemed an opportunity to continue hanging out with amazing Ford Scholars." "I felt that there were still things to accomplish," Schulze said. "I love getting to meet new Scholars and hearing their stories."

Smith said that during Schulze's tenure, he introduced the idea of regional chapters of the FSAA, where Scholars could connect locally. "While the organization didn't have the 'critical mass' to regionalize at the time, it did cause us to look at ways to involve Scholars who didn't reside in urban areas," she explained.

Schulze, 37, graduated from Lewis and Clark College in 1999 with a degree in German studies. He works as a middle school science teacher in Pendleton.

Being in Eastern Oregon and living 200 miles from Portland always presented the challenge of making the board meetings, Schulze acknowledged. "The other big challenge that I think all board members face is finding time to keep up on FSAA business while keeping up on the rest of life."

The past eight years have seen many changes in Schulze's life. Aside from marrying Noelle in 2012 and havbe done well and on time," she said. "Chris is one of the warmest, most positive and caring people I've known. He is a man of integrity and character, which is just about the best thing I can say about someone."

His first term as a member at large lasted six years. During this time, Schulze helped start the Mentoring Program, an accomplishment he views as his most important contribution to his time on the board.

"Charlie Walker, the first director of the Ford Scholars Program, told me once that he hoped our FSAA would be an organization that 'holds hands.' It was a very 'Charlie' sort of statement," Schulze said, adding that mentoring is a valuable way for us to stay connected and to be an organization that "holds hands." Schulze believes Ford Scholar Alumni are a unique group of people with abilities and talents that should be shared with their communities as well as with one another. "It wasn't always smooth or easy, but we strove to carry out that vision," he said.

Former FSAA President Andrea Smith, who served 10 years on the board, commended Schulze for his work on the Mentoring Program.

When Schulze's first term was to end in 2012, he ran for re-election and served until this past July.

Schulze also had some adventures. He walked the Camino de Santiago in Spain and traveled to Lebanon, Syria and Turkey.

## **Retirement Leads to Scholarship Office Staff Changes**

Stella Strother-Blood joined The Ford Family Foundation Scholarship Office in Eugene as the administrative associate in July, replacing Ashley Potter in the role. Potter became the scholarship awards coordinator, following Dee Row's retirement from that position in early August.

The staff at the Scholarship Office hosted a going away party for Row at Ninkasi Brewing and performed a song in her honor to the tune of Elvis' "All Shook Up." They gave her solar flowers for her yard.

At the Ford Scholars Leadership Conference in Sunriver in early August, staff members also presented her with a photo book full of good wishes from Scholars, alumni and financial aid staff that she had worked with over the past 14 years. Row plans to spend more time with her grandchildren during her retirement as well as volunteer in schools and work in her yard.

Potter started with The Foundation as a temporary employee in August of 2007 and was hired as the administrative assistant that November. She became the administrative associate in November 2010, a position she held until this July when she filled Row's position. As the scholarship awards coordinator, Potter is the principal liaison with college financial aid officers and scholarship award recipients. She monitors grades and administers the scholarship renewal process.

Strother-Blood started her position two weeks before the Ford Scholars Leadership Conference in early August.

"She jumped right in and quickly adjusted to the high energy, fastpaced and organized chaos that is summer conferences," said Director of

Strother-Blood, 24, graduated from Western Oregon University in 2012 with Bachelor of Science degrees in community health education and humanities and a minor in international studies. In college, she was a freelance writer for the Western Oregon Journal and a peer tutor in WOU's Writing Center. Most recently, she was the project coordinator at InStove, a nonprofit agency in Cottage Grove, Ore., that distributes institutional cookstoves to clinics, orphanages and schools in developing countries.

While studying abroad in Kenya in 2011, Strother-Blood realized her passion was to improve others' quality of life by increasing access to healthcare and education.

"I had been able to focus on healthcare at InStove, but I wanted to delve more into education," the Eugene native explained, adding that she also wanted to help her own community. "When I saw the Foundation Scholarship Office's job posting, I talked to a few of my friends from college who are Ford Scholar Alumni. They only had praise for the compassionate staff. I knew I had to apply."

Strother-Blood's primary responsibilities include supporting Callahan and serving as the lead in the administrative management of the office. She will also facilitate the selection of the Gerald E. Bruce Community Service Award recipients.

"I am very excited about this award because it highlights the importance of bettering one's community," she said.

Strother-Blood said Ford Scholars have an amazing amount of resources available to them — understanding peers, inspiring conferences, Student Success Counselor Jeff Strickland, as well as financial support. "Why not cultivate other resources? Through the Ford Scholar Alumni Association, alumni can learn of opportunities to give back to their communities and network with other alumni and current Scholars," she said.
